2023 Michael Hill International Violin Competition winner, Jenny, hails from South Korea.

In addition to this first prize at last year's competition, Jenny was also named as the winner of the Chamber Music Prize, and was the recipient of the Sheila Smith Prize, a three-year loan of an exquisite Domenico Montagnana violin, c1735 – 39, facilitated through the Rare Violins of New York Consortium. She has also won top prizes at the 2022 Zhuhai International Violin Competition and the 2020 Stulberg International String Competition.

Jenny started her violin studies at the age of two and was admitted to the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia at the age of nine, studying with the renowned pedagogue Ida Kavafian. Jenny currently attends The Juilliard School as a proud recipient of the Kovner Fellowship, studying with Itzhak Perlman and Li Lin.



Jeonghwan Kim piano

Jeonghwan Kim was the winner of the 2023 Sydney International Piano Competition where he received the first prize along with two special prizes: the Best Overall Concerto Prize and a prize for his performance of Bartók's second piano concerto.

Jeonghwan began his piano studies at the age of six, winning a number a competitions which led to his acceptance into the Seoul Arts Center Academy for Young Talented Musicians at nine years old. He moved to Berlin when he was 11, and has studied at the Hochschule für Musik Hanns Eisler in the class of Professor Konrad Maria Engel since 2007.

In 2019, Jeonghwan won the Aarhus International Piano Competition in Denmark, prompting immediate invitations to perform with the Aarhus and Odense Symphony Orchestras.

In 2022, he was awarded first prize at the Felix Mendelssohn-Bartholdy competition in Berlin, and the audience prize at the Sendai International Piano Competition.

Jeonghwan has given concerts in major halls in Berlin, Weimar, Hamburg, and Aarhus, among others.



Jenny and Jeonghwan will record their debut album during this tour to be produced by Atoll Records for release in 2025.



Our broadcast partners will broadcast live the 24 October concert with the Auckland Philharmonia and will record the 10 November Auckland recital.

Henryk Wieniawski

Polonaise de concert, Op 4

Full of rhythmic energy and soaring lyrical passages, The Polonaise de concert couples the spirit of Polish folk dance with the brilliance of Wieniawski. He was just thirteen when he sketched the original version and developed it over the years into the self-assured virtuosic statement we hear today.

Eugène-Auguste Ysaÿe

Sonata No 5

L'Aurore Danse rustique

Ysaÿe: composer, conductor, the 'tsar' of the violin as Nathan Milstein called him – such was his contribution to the instrument. A hundred years after the Six Sonatas for Solo Violin were written they remain an apex achievement for violinists, demanding a mastery of technique the highest order alongside heartfelt passion. The No. 5 in G major was dedicated to fellow Belgian violinist Mathieu Crickboom.

Frédéric Chopin

Andante spianato and grande polonaise brillante, Op 22

Chopin's first composition at age seven was a polonaise, followed by twenty-three more written throughout his life. The *grande polonaise brillante* for piano and orchestra came first in 1831. In 1834, he wrote the *Andante spianato* – meaning 'even' or 'smooth', this is the only instance of spianato used in Chopin's works – and placed it before the grande polonaise, creating a seamless masterpiece which can be played with or without orchestra.

Michael Norris

Waipounamu

Fixed electronics featuring Ariana Tikao & Jerome Kavanagh (taonga pūoro) and Mana Waiariki (violin).

'Te Waipounamu' is the te reo name for New Zealand's South Island, meaning 'greenstone waters' – Norris weaves a 'sonic tapestry' with the violin, taonga puoro and electronic effects to portray the rugged and magical landscapes, the depths from which the pounamu originates. *Waipounamu* was the set piece for the 2023 Michael Hill International Violin Competition.

Camille Saint-Saëns Violin Sonata No 1 in D minor, Op 75

Allegro agitato Adagio Allegretto moderato Allegro molto

'A grand duo for piano and violin' was the vision Saint-Saëns had when writing the violin sonata No 1 in D minor, composed in Autumn 1885. Dazzling, playful, heroic; it's been described by Grove's Dictionary as one of the composer's best and most characteristic works. The demands of it are such that Saint-Saëns remarked, "I wonder with terror what this sonata will become under the bow of my no less ordinary than extraordinary violinists; it will be called the 'hippogriff sonata'."

After a hiatus brought about from the Covid pandemic, audiences across Aotearoa, New Zealand welcomed the return of the Michael Hill International Violin Competition in June 2023.

16 outstanding young violinists, selected by audition from an initial 160 applicants, were flown

to Queenstown and Auckland and were wholeheartedly embraced by local audiences who journeyed with them through the highs and lows that come with a competition of this calibre.

The 'Michael Hill' remains a favourite on the competition circuit, not just for its prestigious prize package, esteemed judging panel and career-launching opportunities, but also for the warmth and heart that greets every competitor from the moment they touch down in Aotearoa. For the rest of their careers, these artists will be connected to this place and can count on the support of the people they have met over the course of their stay.

WORLD FEDERATION OF INTERNATIONAL MUSIC COMPETITIONS

Both the Michael Hill International Violin Competition and The Sydney International Piano Competition are proud members of the World Federation of International Music Competitions.



Over nearly five decades, the prestigious Sydney International Piano Competition ('The Sydney') has been a leader and change maker on the international stage.

Renowned for showcasing outstanding young pianists and launching international careers, the competition continues to inspire

both pianists and audiences globally, stimulating public interest in the piano and in classical music.

With over \$200,000 in cash prizes and an esteemed judging panel, *The Sydney* is one of the most coveted events on the planet for the piano.

Pivoting online with their 2021 edition following the Covid pandemic, *The Sydney* bounced back to the live stage in 2023, selecting 32 competitors from over 250 applications world-wide, to compete for a life-changing opportunity to take home the First Prize of \$50,000.

After three exhilarating weeks, the competition culminates in four spectacular performances at the Sydney Opera House. Six finalists perform two concertos each with the Sydney Symphony Orchestra on the Concert Hall Stage before the judges make their final decisions.

Shared world-wide by livestream and available to watch on-demand, the experience for artists and audiences alike is uplifting and transformative.

Piano+, home to the almost 50 year old **Sydney International Piano Competition**, is dedicated to nurturing the very best young pianists from Australia and around the globe. Piano+ celebrates the joy of piano – playing, learning, listening – and is your essential resource for the piano in Australia. Season 2024 has been a dazzling array of concert touring, featuring some of the best Australian and international artists, bespoke festivals, enriching music education programs, exciting collaborations and an eclectic line-up of piano events.

A highlight was the Autumn Piano School, held in partnership with the New England Conservatorium of Music in Armidale, NSW. The School allowed numerous piano lovers from beginners to advanced players — to enhance and hone their skills through structured coursework, professional masterclasses and performance opportunities at the five day event. The commitment to providing musical development opportunities for pianists of all ages is unwavering from Piano+.

In July, with support from the City of Sydney, Piano+ introduced Piano+Place, a series of unique concerts by contemporary artists in remarkable venues such as the Anzac Memorial, the State Library of New South Wales, Paddington Town Hall and Elizabeth Bay House. Jim Moginie (Midnight Oil), David Bridie (Not Drowning Waving), Chris Abrahams and Sophie Hutchings explored innovative storytelling through their performances that responded to the built environment and history of each venue.

Now in its third consecutive year, Out West Piano Fest—a three-day celebration of piano music, gastronomy and art—featured Konstantin Shamray, winner of the 2008 Sydney International Piano Competition and much loved audience favourite, as its Musical Director. Konstantin crafted a remarkable musical journey of known and hidden gems, performed in partnership with leading Australian pianists Vatche Jambazian, Lee Dionne and Grace Kim, held at historic Blackdown Farm in Bathurst, NSW.

The International Recital Series and Emerging Artist Series showcased the talents of both established and emerging artists to audiences in Melbourne, Sydney, Brisbane and Canberra. The Australian tour of 2023's Competition First Prize winner is currently underway, and we look forward to wrapping up the year with stellar performances by Jeonghwan Kim and violinist Yeyeong Jenny Jin with The Young Virtuosi.
